## **STEPHEN'S MEDITATION ON SCARY OCTOBER**

One of the great trends that I have observed in my lifetime is the scarification of October. As we enter the month which ends with Halloween, we see that the scariest movies are put into the theatres and on television; haunted houses and terrifying thrill-rides at theme parks do big business; and trick-or-treaters where ever more gruesome costumes.

What gives? I have a quirky theory. I think it comes down to the difference between acute and chronic anxiety. Acute anxiety is caused by a sudden fright that quickly goes away. Chronic anxiety lingers indefinitely. I experience acute anxiety when I can't find my keys for a few minutes, but then remember where I left them. When I am diagnosed with, say, diabetes, and know I will have to deal with it for the rest of my life, my anxiety is chronic.

My hunch is that we are all living through a time of growing chronic anxiety. We all know that the world economy is in serious trouble, even if here in Central Nebraska we have been relatively spared. We know that families are under more and more stress. We know that the government and other institutions—including the church—are not as respected or as effective as they used to be. We know that our lives could be disrupted or ended by any number of unforeseen catastrophes: a new plague, debilitating disease, environmental disaster, economic collapse, or war.

It's only natural that we prefer to distract ourselves from chronic anxieties by deliberately exposing ourselves to passing moments of acute fear—hence the popularity of scary movies, thrill rides, and gruesome costumes.

We could 'shame, shame' and fondly remembering some hypothetical good-old days—although I'm guessing that those among us with memories of the Great Depression and World War II would wonder how we would deal if we were posed, as they were in their generation, with a double dose of very real acute and chronic anxieties at the same time. Or we could remember who we are and—more importantly—whose we are. We are Christians. We are friends, followers, disciples, and soldiers of Christ. Jesus has already met and mastered our fears. Every one of our acute anxieties was concentrated on the cross. What greater chronic anxiety is there than the sin of the world for which he shed his blood?

With every step we take in our journey with Jesus, with every increase in the quality and character of our relationship with Christ, we overcome the fears that paralyze and distract us. Faith is the existence in our hearts of a space into which the Spirit of God brings courage and peace. And it is only through people with courage and peace that the chronic anxieties of our times can be overcome by the eternal hope that is in Christ.

Jesus is Lord: Rejoice! Jesus is Lord: Fear not! Jesus is Lord: Win!

See you in church.

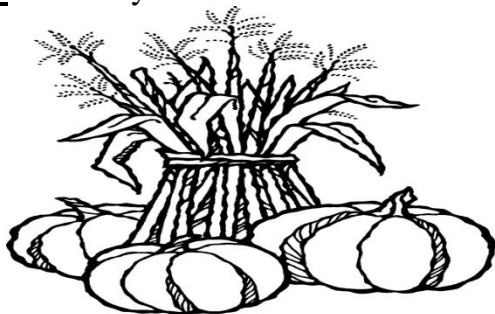

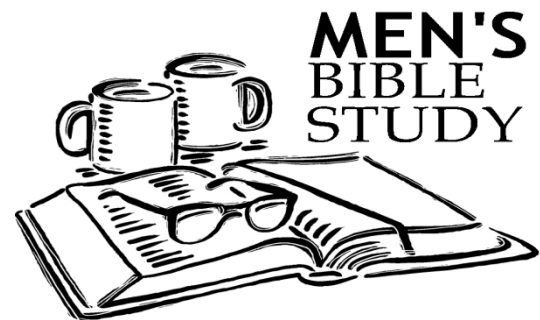

## CLEANUP BUCKETS ARE NEEDED!

Many parts of the United States have experienced a large amount of flooding this year due to rapid melting of an above-average snowpack in the Upper Midwest, above-normal precipitation during the spring, and after-effects from Hurricanes Irene and Lee.

One of the ways that PDA helps in response to flooding is through Gift of the Heart kit Clean-up buckets.

These buckets are extremely helpful as a first step in the recovery process. Unfortunately, the large number of disasters has pretty much exhausted the Church World Service supply of Clean-up buckets. A shipment of 250 Clean-up buckets was recently sent to a Presbyterian church near Binghamton, New York, to help that community begin the recovery process, but more are needed for other locations.

## THE S.A.F.E. CENTER OFFERS “SUCCESSFUL YOU” CLASS

The S.A.F.E. Center is offering a new class for women called “**Successful YOU**”. This twelve session class will allow women to focus on improving mind, body and spirit.

‘Successful YOU’ is being offered through a grant that was received by The S.A.F.E. Center from the Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Linda Post Bushkofsky, Executive Director of Women of the ELCA, notes that “The grants program of Women of the ELCA allows the women of the church to carry out ministry in many different ways and through many exciting programs across the country and around the globe.” The S.A.F.E. Center was honored to be a recipient of this grant and to be offered the opportunity to add an additional service for the community.

Sessions will be offered every other week starting on October 6 and will be held from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Topics include: healthy relationships, interview skills, stress management, meals on a dime, holistic healing, effective organization and more. Community members who have expertise on the various issues will assist with the educational portion of the evening. Activities and a healthy snack will be provided and the evening will end with an hour of yoga by a certified instructor. These classes are open to women residing in Buffalo, Franklin, Harlan, Kearney and Phelps Counties. As class size is limited, priority will be given to women who have survived domestic violence, but sessions are open to any woman looking for a fun way to learn new skills and focus on their mental and physical health. # DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The S.A.F.E. Center encourages the public to show support of ending violence in the community with attendance at upcoming events.

On Sunday, October 9, at 2:00 p.m., The S.A.F.E. Center, United Way of the Kearney Area and Nebraska Arts Council will sponsor a staged reading of the play *In My Daughter's Name*. This play, presented by The Angels Theatre Company and written by Becky Key Boesen, takes a very personal look at domestic violence. Amanda Thomas, the daughter referred to in the title, was 27 years old when she was murdered by her ex-boyfriend and the father of one of her children. The play bears witness to the circumstances and complications leading up to Amanda's death in 2009. Amanda's mother Jody meets a writer who wants to tell Amanda's story and together, the two women chronicle the cycle of this family's violence. To make this production accessible to audiences across Nebraska, a staged reading of *In My Daughter's Name* has been adapted for touring purpose. The event will take place at the UNK Fine Arts Building in the Recital Hall and the cost is a freewill donation.

The annual Step OUT Against Violence event will be held on Monday, October 10<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. at the Holiday Inn. This evening includes music by the OK Sisters, a candlelight vigil and a 5K walk to the bridge by Yanney Park. This is an opportunity to join with others working to end intimate partner violence and learn about activities in the community that prevent and end violence. Sponsors for the event include: The S.A.F.E. Center, United Way of the Kearney Area, University of Nebraska at Kearney and Great Plains Safety and Health Organization. # PEACEMAKING OFFERING

Every time our congregation receives the Lord's Supper, there is opportunity to remember other Christians around the world who are also receiving these gifts of God. But we make a special point of remembering our unity with Christians worldwide on World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday in October, it is a day to be mindful of the love of Christ, who draws us all together despite our many differences.

As Presbyterians, we recognize that Christ taught us to be peacemakers as part of being Christ's followers. So on World Communion Sunday, we receive the bread and cup of heaven, and we bring our gifts of self, service, and money to be put to work for Christ's peace in the world.

This year is the thirty-first anniversary of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program and the Peacemaking Offering. The Offering was set up in a way to encourage all levels of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to work for peace. Each congregation is invited to find ways to promote peace within the congregation and within the community. For that reason, our church will retain 25 percent of the Offering we receive, and the Session will decide how best to put this money to work. Another 25 percent goes to our Presbytery or Synod, and the remaining 50 percent goes to the General Assembly for peacemaking involvement throughout the world.

Join us on October 2nd as our church celebrates World Communion Sunday and as we commit to being instruments of the peace we find in Christ. Come ready to give generously to the Peacemaking Offering.

8. Put cookies into bags and tie with a ribbon. Then give away these edible smiles!

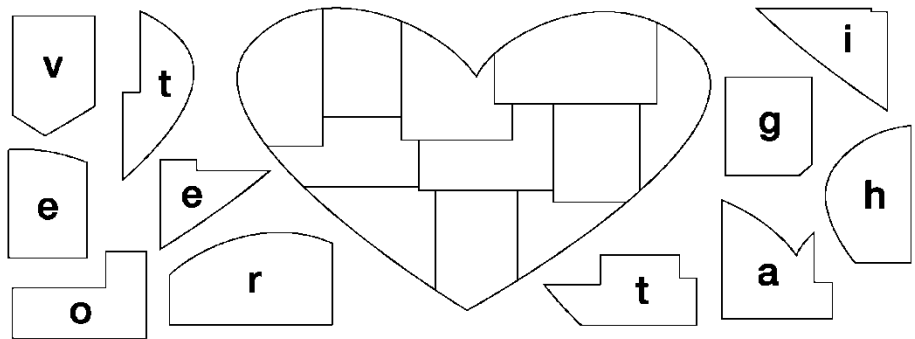

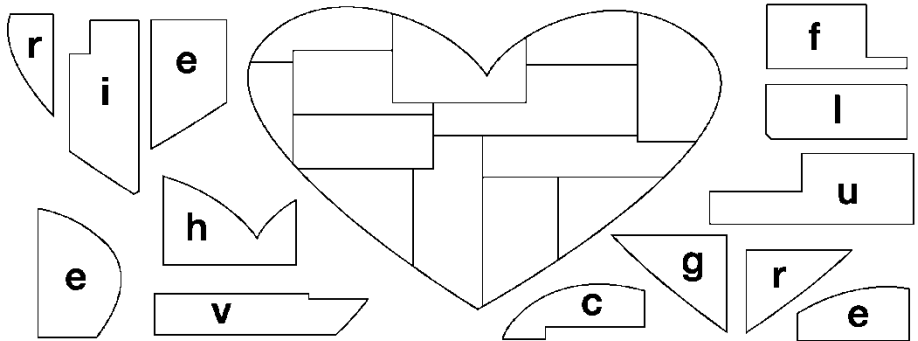

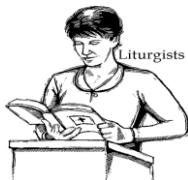
